Dear Mr. Chairman:

This fact sheet is the third in a series in response to your January 5, 1995, request that we examine the functions performed by agencies in the federal government. You asked that we identify those functions that are uniquely associated with each agency and those that are performed by two or more agencies. In particular, this fact sheet also addresses your specific request that we provide an "accounting of expenditures" so that "both administrative and mission-oriented operations are identified."

In our initial responses¹ to this request, we provided actual 1993 and 1994 and estimated 1995 obligation² and employment information, by department and agency and by budget function, as reported in the President's <u>Budget of the United States Government</u>. These products offered perspectives on the relationship between areas of national need and federal organizational and staffing patterns. In this fact sheet, we extend this work by describing fiscal year 1994 obligations by subdepartment³ and subfunction, and by focusing on objects of expenditure within subfunctions. Using this approach, we can more precisely describe federal activities by characterizing obligations according to the nature of the service or article procured. Appendix I provides further details on our scope and methodology.

Both the function and object classification systems are ways to array financial information in budget presentations. Function classifications are the categories that the Congress uses in the concurrent resolutions on the budget, pursuant to the Congressional Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 632), and provide a method to classify budgetary resources according to the national need addressed--the results or "ends" of federal activities. The object classification system captures the immediate objects rather than the results of government spending--the "means" of federal activities.⁴

The format for this fact sheet, similar to our earlier products, involves numerous tables and graphs. Appendix II provides 1994 obligations by function and subfunction and by department and subdepartment, while appendix III provides a graphical overview of 1994 obligations by function and by object category. Appendixes IV through XXI summarize 1994 obligations for each function and then break out each subfunction by object.

Arraying subdepartments by the budget subfunction(s) that they perform provides a more detailed view of the relationship between the varied missions of the federal government and its organizational structures. As discussed in our previous products and as depicted in appendix II, a full range of relationships can be described among the 78 budget subfunctions⁵ and the many subdepartmental structures.

- In some cases, a "one-to-one" relationship exists between subfunctions and subdepartments. For example, Medicare; Postal Service; Social Security; Federal Correctional Activities; and Space Flight, Research and Supporting Activities are all associated with a single organization. Similarly, many subdepartments, such as Justice's Drug Enforcement Administration or Transportation's Federal Aviation Administration, code all obligations against a single subfunction.
- In other cases, one subfunction may be associated with multiple subdepartments. For example, the subfunctions Other Advancement of Commerce, Federal Law Enforcement Activities, and Agricultural Research and Services are addressed by 21, 19, and 17 subdepartments, within 8, 9, and 2 departments and agencies, respectively.
- Lastly, a single subdepartment may make obligations against multiple

subfunctions. Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service records obligations against five subfunctions: Conservation and Land Management, Water Resources, Pollution Control and Abatement, Farm Income Stabilization, and Natural Resources and Environment. Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs obligates against four subfunctions: Area and Regional Development; Elementary, Secondary and Vocational Education; Conservation and Land Management; and Other General Government. Labor's Employment and Training Administration is associated with three subfunctions: Unemployment Compensation, Training and Employment, and Income Security.

The function/subfunction structure can be used to more precisely describe national need areas and obligational patterns within those areas. As depicted in appendixes IV through XXI, some functions, for example National Defense, Energy, and Agriculture, are dominated by a single subfunction, which may account for 90 percent or more of total obligations for the function. In other cases, obligations are more evenly spread among subfunctions. Community and Regional Development; Income Security; and Education, Employment and Social Services are examples of functions with a more even pattern of obligations among subfunctions.

A different perspective can be obtained by linking object classifications to subfunctions.⁶ This type of mapping can provide a comparative perspective on the "means" of public programs--the "how" in addition to the "how much"--and contribute to a general understanding of the different ways the federal government addresses various national needs. When combined with the subdepartment information shown in appendix II, the variations in addressing national needs become clearer. The following illustrates some of the relationships portrayed in appendixes IV through XXI.

- Comparing salary obligations to obligations for consulting and other contractual services can indicate the extent to which services within a given mission area are directly performed by the federal government or by contractors. For example, contractor obligations dominate some technical or scientific areas, such as the Energy function and the Space Flight, Research and Supporting Activities subfunction. Alternatively, some federal activities, such as the Veterans Benefits and Services function and the Postal Service and Federal Law Enforcement Activities subfunctions, tend to devote larger shares of total obligations to salaries. In some cases, a given function, such as Natural Resources and Environment, shows varying patterns in object expenditures among its subfunctions.
- The dominant mode of federal operations is direct provision of cash benefits.
 As appendix III shows, the largest share of federal obligations is devoted to transfer payments--such as insurance and retirement benefits--and grants. For

example, insurance payments represent almost three-quarters or more of total obligations in six subfunctions: Social Security, Medicare, Unemployment Compensation, Veterans Income Security, General Retirement and Disability Insurance, and Federal Employee Retirement and Disability. In 27 other subfunctions, grants and subsidies represent 35 percent or more of total obligations.

It is important to emphasize that only general patterns can be discerned from the tables and graphs in the appendixes to this fact sheet. Drawing specific conclusions must be tempered because of the way these data are reported. All of the data presented herein are reported as part of the annual budget process and reflect the current account structure. Extending any observation to a specific program or activity-however defined within budget accounts--may be problematic. In addition, specific limitations to note in using this data include the following.

- Individual function and subfunction classifications may not uniformly describe a set of activities. For example, the Commerce and Housing Credit function does not include the Housing Assistance subfunction, which is in the Income Security function. Similarly, the Income Security function does not include the Social Security, Veterans Income Security, or Farm Income Stabilization subfunctions. Also, some subfunctions are based on activities (e.g., Health Care Services within the Health function), and some on client groups within activities (e.g., Hospital and Medical Care for Veterans within the Veterans Benefits and Services function).
- Departments and agencies are afforded some discretion when coding obligations against the function and subfunction categories. For example, some departments code obligations for management and administration against a single subfunction (e.g., Energy, Justice, and Labor) and others against two or more functions (e.g., Agriculture, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, and Treasury).
- Departments and agencies report gross obligations. These reported obligations reflect total agreements but not necessarily the level of resulting outlays, either department-wide or government-wide, made in a particular fiscal year.⁷ In addition, some of these obligations may be made to other budget accounts or to other departments and agencies, which are then "re-obligated" by the receiving account. While this may appear to cause "double-counting" from the perspective of deficits and net outlays, this method of reporting obligations does ensure an accurate and complete portrayal of federal commitments and the objects procured.

Although the object classification system can be used to generally differentiate federal "operating costs" from transfer and interest payments, it can not accurately segregate operating costs into administrative and mission-related components. Object classifications only address the things bought, not the reasons for the expenditure. Thus, salary obligations may support janitorial services or nuclear facility inspections; capital acquisitions might include postage machines or battleships. In any operational sense, distinguishing mission from administrative costs through object classifications is impractical. However, as we have previously reported, the lack of a consistent definition or tracking of administrative costs is not unique to the federal government; even within the private sector, such expenses are not defined in accounting standards and are not required to be reported separately in audited financial statements.

The data presented herein are indicative, but not conclusive concerning questions posed in your request letter. We believe that this information, in conjunction with that included in our previous products, provides a useful starting point for more detailed lines of inquiry. We will continue to work with your office as needed to more fully explore and analyze these and related data so that we can provide the most useful assistance to your Committee.

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Scope and Methodology

As part of their annual budget submission to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), departments and agencies are required to report obligations by budget account, which are coded to reflect the categories of the function and object classification systems. OMB collects and processes this information through an automated information system--the MAX budget system--which is used to prepare the President's annual budget request. We obtained this automated file and extracted and summarized actual fiscal year 1994 obligations by department and agency, function and subfunction, and object class. We did not verify these reported data for individual budget accounts, but we did reconcile total obligations to published sources.

For organizational summaries, we focused on the 24 departments and agencies defined by the Chief Financial Officers Act of 1990, as amended. We also accumulated obligations made by the Legislative and Judicial Branches, the Executive Office of the President (including funds appropriated to the President), and other independent agencies.

For function and subfunction summaries, we used the OMB-defined structure displayed in appendix II. In those cases where a subdepartment reported an account's obligations to more than one function, we allocated the obligations on the same percentage basis as reported for the account's budget authority. In some cases, an account's obligations were coded only against a function, with no further assignment to a particular subfunction. We reviewed each of these accounts and, where possible, 2 assigned the obligations to a subfunction. Each of these assignments is footnoted in appendix II.

To simplify the presentation of object data, we combined 19 OMB-defined object classes³ into 9 object categories, as shown in table I.1. That table also displays the OMB object classification structure and the corresponding short title used in our graphs. Also, we excluded from the subfunction graphs in appendixes IV through XXI all object categories with total 1994 obligations of less than \$1 million dollars. Although this approach excluded some obligations from 38 subfunction graphs, the effect was insignificant; in percentage terms, the largest exclusion represented one-quarter of one percent of the subfunction's total obligations.



In appendixes IV through XXI, each function is first summarized by subfunction, to depict relative shares within the function, and then by object category. The succeeding subfunction graphs display obligations by object category, with the subfunctions listed in descending order according to total obligations. To aid comparisons between functions and subfunctions, the shading and/or pattern for each object category has been standardized, according to the model shown below in figure I.1.
