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Dear Senator McGovern:

In response to your request of February 28, 1973, and in accordance with agreements reached with your office, we are sending you (1) an inventory of Federal programs to aid the social and economic development of Indian reservations, identifying those programs specifically for Indians living on reservations and those which are part of a program with a broader scope, and (2) the appropriations and expenditures for these programs, including information on funds that have been impounded.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior, administers a number of programs which were created specifically to aid the <u>education</u>, <u>social</u>, <u>and economic development of Indians living on reservations. The Bureau's records show the following appropriations and expenditures for these programs during the last two fiscal years.</u>



The major expenditures were for education, welfare and guidance services, Alaska Native Claims, relocation and adult vocational training, and Federal aid for constructing highways on reservations. (See enc. I.)

For fiscal year 1973, \$31.5 million of the Bureau's construction appropriation funds--\$29.5 million for buildings and utilities and \$2 million for irrigation systems--were impounded by the Office of Management and Budget. The Bureau gave us information which showed that \$101,000 of fiscal year 1972 irrigation systems construction appropriations had been impounded but were subsequently released on July 1, 1972.



Other Federal agencies annually report to the Bureau showing funds provided to benefit Indians but do not distinguish between funds expended for Indians living on or off reservations. A Bureau official told us that the Bureau did not provide written instructions to other Federal agencies informing them on what to base amounts nor did it verify the information reported. Therefore amounts could be based on appropriations, obligations, or expenditures.

The Indian Health Service and the Office of Education, two agencies of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, administer programs specifically for Indians. The Health Service administers programs primarily to benefit Indians on reservations, and the Office of Education, under the Indian Elementary and Secondary School Assistance Act (20 U.S.C. 242), administers programs for Indians on or off the reservation. Other Federal agencies administer programs of broader scope which also provide funds for Indians living on or off reservations. In fiscal years 1972 and 1973 these funds totaled \$411.5 million and \$486.9 million, respectively.

The programs which provided the most funds for Indians were for health services, housing, local flood protection or reservoir control work, community action, and education. (See enc. II.)

We did not verify the expenditures or other data in this report because we agreed to send you the information as soon as possible, and verification would have taken considerably more time.

We do not plan to distribute this report further unless you agree or publicly announce its contents.
