

DOCUMENT RESUME

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A survey was conducted of the nonappropriated fund activities operated by executive agencies to sell merchandise or services to Government personnel. Data supplied by departments and agencies on the nature and size of such activities and where they are operated are listed. A brief description of each nonappropriated fund activity is presented together with data on its current assets on June 30, 1975, and its gross revenue during fiscal year 1975. A summary list also provides data on the totals for each department or agency and is keyed to detailed lists of nonappropriated fund activities.

Findings/Conclusions: Executive departments and agencies reported nonappropriated fund and related activities with over \$1.6 billion in current assets and over \$8.2 billion in gross revenues. The Department of Defense has, by far, the largest number of activities, accounting for 98% of the assets and revenue reported. Some reporting offices took the position that certain of their programs were not Government nonappropriated fund activities but were private associations not officially a part of the Federal Government. Since there is no official definition or commonly understood opinion of what is or is not a nonappropriated fund activity, it is difficult to gather reliable information about nonappropriated fund activities in the executive agencies. No attempt has been made to establish any criterion which would strictly classify the activities as nonappropriated fund activities or otherwise. (Author/SC)

Magnitude Of Nonappropriated Fund And Related Activities In The Executive Branch

Executive departments and agencies reported nonappropriated fund and related activities with over \$1.6 billion in current assets and over \$8.2 billion in gross revenues.

This study includes a list of nonappropriated fund and other employee benefit activities carried on by departments and agencies of the executive branch. The list shows the nature and size of such activities and where they are operated.

The Department of Defense has by far the largest number of activities. It accounts for 98 percent of assets and revenue reported.

PREFACE

Title III of the General Accounting Office Act of 1974 (Public Law 93-604) gave GAO audit authority over nonappropriated fund activities operated by executive agencies to sell merchandise or services to Government personnel. (App. I contains the text of title III.) The attached listing shows the nature and size of such activities and where they are operated. The departments and agencies furnished the data, and GAO has not verified it.

This study supersedes our staff study, "Magnitude of Nonappropriated Fund Activities In the Executive Branch," (FPCD-76-58) July 5, 1976. It includes minor changes and also data previously not available on the Department of Defense.

Included is a brief description of each nonappropriated fund activity, its current assets on June 30, 1975, and its gross revenue during fiscal year 1975. In some cases data was not available in that form or for those dates, and exceptions are footnoted. A summary list, beginning on page iii, shows totals for each department or agency and is keyed to detailed lists of the activities on pages 1 through 73.

Some reporting offices took the position that certain of their programs were not Government nonappropriated fund activities but were private associations not officially a part of the Federal Government. Varying interpretations are understandable since there is no official definition or commonly understood opinion of what is or is not a nonappropriated fund activity.

In fact, a study 1/ prepared for the Office of Management and Budget concluded that the lack of a Government-wide definition of nonappropriated fund activities causes confusion and prevents the identification and gathering of reliable information about nonappropriated fund operations in the executive agencies. To remedy this the study recommended that OMB issue definitions of "nonappropriated funds," "nonappropriated fund instrumentality," and "private organization." For this list we have not attempted to establish any criterion which would strictly classify the activities as nonappropriated fund activities or otherwise. Rather, it is a compilation of nonappropriated fund and related activities authorized by departments and agencies of the executive branch to provide a morale, welfare, or recreational benefit for their employees.

We excluded certain funds for expediency or because they did not fall within the act. These were:

- Nonappropriated funds for other purposes, such as trust funds and revenue-producing activities that the Smithsonian Institution and National Science Foundation use to further certain of their programs.
- Federal credit unions, which are operated and regulated under the Federal Credit Union Act.
- Coffee and "sunshine" funds, which are usually small and informal.
- Funds of agencies with less than 100 employees.
- Nonappropriated funds of the Federal Reserve System and Central Intelligence Agency.

TITLE III--AUDIT OF NONAPPROPRIATED FUND ACTIVITIES

Sec. 301. (a) The (1) operations and funds (including central funds) of nonappropriated fund and related activities authorized or operated by an executive agency to sell merchandise or services to military or other Government personnel and their dependents, such as the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, Navy Exchanges, Marine Corps Exchanges, Coast Guard Exchanges, Exchange Councils of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, commissaries, clubs, and theaters, (2) systems of accounting and internal controls of such funds and activities, and (3) any internal or independent audits or reviews of such funds and activities shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be subject to review by the Comptroller General of the United States in accordance with such principles and procedures and under such rules and regulations as he may prescribe. The Comptroller General and his duly authorized representatives shall have access to those books, accounts, records, documents, reports, files, and other papers, things, or property relevant to funds and activities within this subsection as are deemed necessary by the Comptroller General.

(b) When required by the Comptroller General for such nonappropriated fund and related activities with gross receipts from sales of more than \$100,000 a year as he may designate by class, or upon specific request of the Comptroller General in any other case, each executive agency shall furnish promptly a copy of the annual report of any nonappropriated fund or related activity referred to in subsection (a). If such information is not included in any activity's annual report, such agency shall also furnish a statement showing the yearly financial operations, financial condition, and cash flow, and such other annual information relating to the activity as may be agreed upon by the Comptroller General and the head of the executive agency concerned.
