Dear Senator Ashcroft:

Substance abuse surveys are being sponsored by the federal government to determine national drug use patterns and trends, attitudes and behaviors, treatment participation and effectiveness, as well as perceived illicit drug accessibility and harm. Your staff asked that we compile a listing of the major national drug surveys and determine the extent to which familial and religious/spiritual variables have been included in these survey instruments.


We identified 10 major drug surveys encompassing the client population, the general population, and high-risk target groups. Nine of these surveys have been sponsored by either the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the National Institute on Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse, or the National Institute of Justice. The tenth survey has been sponsored by the Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education, a service organization that has conducted research involving thousands of school-aged youth. A synopsis of each of these surveys, conducted one or more times in the 1990s, is provided in enclosure I.

We identified 38 familial and 20 religious/spiritual variables across the 10 surveys. Each of these variables, as well as the frequency with which they are cited in each of the surveys, is depicted in enclosure II. Enclosure III provides the relevant survey question numbers for each variable citation indicated in enclosure II.

DRUG ABUSE SURVEYS REVIEWED

1. The National Household Survey on Drug Abuse (NHSDA)

Description: The NHSDA is a nationally representative survey for measuring drug prevalence and population subgroup drug use patterns and trends among the civilian noninstitutionalized population aged 12 and older.

Sponsor: The NHSDA has been sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) since 1992. Initially (1971-72) it was sponsored by the National Commission on Marijuana and Dangerous Drugs. In the interim years, the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) sponsored the survey.

Frequency of administration: The survey was conducted every 1 to 3 years during the period 1971 through 1990. Since 1990, it has been conducted yearly.

Sample size: In 1990 the sample size was 9,259. Between 1991 and 1993, the sample size varied between 26,489 and 32,594.

GAO review: NHSDA questionnaire used in 1996 (1 form).

2. Monitoring the Future (MF)

Description: MF is a nationally representative study for assessing drug use patterns, trends, attitudes, and behaviors among eighth and tenth graders, high school seniors, and young adults.

Sponsor: NIDA.

Frequency of administration: The high school senior survey has been conducted annually since 1975. The eighth and tenth grade surveys have been conducted annually since 1991.

Sample size: Eighth graders: between 17,300 and 18,600 students per year; tenth graders: between 14,800 and 15,800 per year; high school seniors: between 15,000 and 18,000 per year (as of 1976).

GAO review: Multiple questionnaires from the high school senior survey used in 1995 (6 forms).

3. Drug Abuse Treatment Outcome Study (DATOS)

Description: DATOS is one of the most extensive studies of community-based drug abuse treatment. The study examines the effectiveness of drug abuse treatment in addition to exploring specific aspects of the drug abuse treatment system (that is, the delivery process, treatments, and services available).

Sponsor: NIDA.

Frequency of administration: One-time study.

Sample size: Approximately 10,000 clients from about 100 treatment programs in 11 cities.

GAO review: The client intake questionnaire and 1-month in-treatment questionnaire (2 forms).

4. Cocaine Treatment Outcome Study (CTOS), formerly the Early Retrospective Study of Cocaine Treatment Outcomes.

Description: CTOS represents a preliminary attempt to assess cocaine treatment outcomes across a variety of different types of treatment facilities.

Sponsor: NIDA.

Frequency of administration: One-time study.

Sample size: 772 clients in seven of the DATOS test cities.

GAO review: 12-month follow-up questionnaire (1 form).

5. National Treatment Improvement Evaluation Study (NTIES)

Description: NTIES represents a national study of Center for Substance Abuse Treatment-funded grantees (1990-92) aimed at gaining a better understanding of drug treatment process and follow-up outcome effects. The study addresses client drug and alcohol use, treatment retention, justice involvement, housing, educational and occupational involvement, and health and mental health outcome status.

Sponsor: Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, SAMHSA.

Frequency of administration: One-time study.

Sample size: 6,593.

GAO review: Intake questionnaire and treatment experience questionnaire (2 forms).

6. National Longitudinal Alcohol Epidemiologic Survey (NLAES)

Description: NLAES is a nationally representative survey comprising the largest alcohol study ever conducted in the United States. The study examines national drug and alcohol use; abuse and dependence patterns and their risk factors; and clarification of the relationship between using alcohol and drugs and depression.

Sponsor: National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism.

Frequency of administration: One-time study.

Sample size: More than 40,000 respondents.

GAO review: NLAES questionnaire (1 form).

7. Drug Use Forecasting (DUF)

Description: DUF is a multisite drug study of booked arrestees. The primary intent is to determine the types of drugs being used in more than 20 metropolitan areas, levels of use, and changing patterns over time.

Sponsor: National Institute of Justice (NIJ).

Frequency of administration: Quarterly since 1987.

Sample size: Approximately 225 adult males per quarter, per site; 100 adult females per quarter, per site (more than 20 adult sites participating).

Approximately 100 male juveniles per quarter, per site; no target set for number of juvenile females per quarter, per site.

1994 total sample: Approximately 20,000 adult males, 7,800 adult females, 4,500 juvenile males, and 800 juvenile females.

GAO review: Ongoing adult survey (1 form).

8. Drug Services Research Survey (DSRS)

Description: The DSRS constitutes a database identifying the characteristics of a nationally representative sample of 1,183 drug abuse treatment facilities and the drug use and treatment history of a representative sample of clients discharged in the past year.

Sponsor: Initially sponsored by NIDA; currently under the direction of SAMHSA.

Frequency of administration: Client information collected once.

Sample size: Approximately 2,200 clients discharged from a subsample of 120 treatment programs.

GAO review: Client record abstract for DSRS phase II (1 form).

9. Drug Abuse Warning Network (DAWN)

Description: DAWN consists of two components: an emergency room form representing weighted drug use estimates across all emergency rooms in the coterminous 48 states and a medical examiner form based on the drug reports of more than 100 medical examiners in 27 metropolitan areas.

Sponsor: Initially sponsored by NIDA; currently under the direction of SAMHSA.

Frequency of administration: Yearly reports.

Sample size: Between 314,600 and 466,900 drug episodes between 1978 and 1993.

GAO review: Emergency room form used in 1993 (1 form).

10. The Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education, Inc. (PRIDE) Student Drug Questionnaires

Description: PRIDE conducts surveys in elementary, middle, and secondary schools, emphasizing past-year student drug use, drug accessibility, student attitudes about the harmfulness of drugs, and peer usage.

Sponsor: PRIDE.

Frequency of administration: Yearly since 1982.

Sample size: Total junior and senior high school students for the 1986-87 school year, 66,985; for 1987 through 1995, between 196,447 and 392,003.

GAO review: Ongoing questionnaires for grades 4 through 6 and 6 through 12 (2 forms).
