**Information On Programs Involved
In The President's Swap Proposal**

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In his State of the Union address, the President proposed that the States assume financial and administrative responsibility for the Food Stamp and Aid to Families with Dependent Children Programs. In exchange, the Federal Government would assume all costs of the Medicaid Program.

For these three programs GAO is providing statistical information on historical program growth, projections for future growth, differences in benefit levels among States, and effects of unemployment on program participation. This information is intended to assist the Congress in its deliberations on the "swap" proposal.

On March 3, 1982, you asked us to provide the following statistical information on the Food Stamp, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), and Medicaid Programs:

- Program growth (by State).
- Differences in benefit levels among the States.
- Degree of correlation between program growth and unemployment.
- Administrative structure of each program.
- The extent to which recipients of the Food Stamp Program receive benefits from the AFDC and Medicaid Programs.
- Projections for future program growth.

Following is a summary of the data we compiled. Detailed schedules are presented in the appendixes.

Proposed swap of programs

On January 26, 1982, President Reagan proposed a "New Federalism" program which would transfer responsibility for many Federal programs to the States. The proposal's centerpiece was a plan whereby the States would assume financial and administrative responsibility for the Food Stamp and AFDC Programs and in return the Federal Government would assume all costs of the Medicaid Program. As proposed, this swap would occur in fiscal year 1984. However, according to recent press reports, the proposed transfer may be deferred or dropped altogether.

Program growth

All three programs have experienced a large dollar growth over the past years (fiscal years 1977-81). The number of Food Stamp Program participants also has increased but has tended to level out over the last 2 years. The number of participants in the Medicaid and AFDC Programs has remained relatively steady over the entire period. The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has noted that the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 will play a major role in holding down future increases in Food Stamp Program costs by restricting program eligibility.

The following tables show how recipient benefits and program participation have changed since 1977. All costs and participation data in this report are for the 50 States and the District of Columbia; the Territories are excluded.

Changes in program costs are determined by several variables. For example:

- Program costs for all three programs are directly affected by changes in the number of participants and their income levels.
- Legislative or regulatory changes can affect benefit amounts and/or eligibility requirements.
- Medicaid costs can change as the cost of medical services changes or as the number of Medicaid program options changes (at the option of the State).
- AFDC costs change when States alter their needs standard (the income a State deems essential for basic consumption items) or their payment standard (100 percent or less of the needs standard).
- Food Stamp Program costs change when the Thrifty Food Plan, the basis for Food Stamp benefits, is adjusted.

Changes in the number of program recipients can be attributed to such factors as:

- Changes in economic conditions such as unemployment, which can change the number of persons eligible for benefits.
- Legislative changes which can reduce or increase income and resource standards used in determining program eligibility or change basic program concepts involving the computation and distribution of program benefits.
- Changes in family composition and population distribution.

Differences in benefit levels

The benefit levels of the AFDC and Medicaid Programs vary widely from State to State. (See app. III, fig. 32-34.) This variation is due to different State needs standards for AFDC and/or fewer or greater Medicaid options offered by the individual States. For example, the maximum AFDC benefit available for a one-parent family of three is \$96 in Mississippi and \$506 in California. As of September 1981, Wyoming offered 7 optional Medicaid services while Minnesota offered 31 optional services.

The Food Stamp Program has uniform, national eligibility and benefit schedules. Households of the same size having the same net income after deductions would receive the same monthly coupon allotment in all but two States. ^{1/} However, Food Stamp

^{1/}Alaska and Hawaii are the two exceptions. Both States have a different Thrifty Food Plan schedule than the 48 contiguous States.

recipients whose only income was the maximum AFDC grant would get higher benefit levels in a State with low AFDC benefits than in a State with higher benefits.

Program growth and unemployment

The unemployment rate affects program growth for all three programs but affects the Food Stamp Program the most. On a national basis, a 1-percent increase in unemployment would add about 1.1 million persons to the Food Stamp Program. The relationship between unemployment and AFDC participation is more complex. While an increase in unemployment will lead to an increase in AFDC enrollment in subsequent months, an equal decline in unemployment will not lead to a corresponding participant reduction. This is due to policy provisions which allow AFDC participants under some conditions to remain in the program after returning to work. Medicaid is the least responsive of the three programs to unemployment primarily because a large portion of Medicaid recipients are the aged, disabled, or medically needy. These recipients are unlikely to be affected by unemployment rate fluctuations.

Appendix V provides additional details on the variables affecting changes in program participation for all three programs and discusses how these variables interact in CBO and agency models.

Program administration

The Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs are jointly administered by the State and Federal Governments. The Federal Government establishes varying degrees of benefit and eligibility criteria, shares administrative costs, and pays for all or a portion of program benefits. The States conduct the bulk of the programmatic aspects of administration, such as determining applicants' eligibility status and benefit levels and assuring that benefits are delivered to eligible participants.

In all 50 States and the District of Columbia the same State agency administers both the Food Stamp and AFDC Programs. Only eight States have a different administrative agency for Medicaid.

Multiple program beneficiaries

Individuals can and often do receive benefits simultaneously from either the Food Stamp, AFDC, or Medicaid Programs. In 1980, for example, 47 percent of all Food Stamp recipients received AFDC benefits and 63 percent received Medicaid benefits; and in 1979, 75 percent of all AFDC recipients received Food Stamp benefits. All AFDC recipients (except those in Arizona) are eligible for Medicaid. (See app. IV.)

Projections for future growth

Both CBO and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) have projected future program outlays for the Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs. These projections--based upon various economic and programmatic assumptions--are usually most accurate for the immediate future with diminishing accuracy in each successive year. Also, projections are limited to national totals because State-by-State projections require collecting various local data such as State unemployment rates, inflation, and specific service costs and availability. Such State data is difficult and expensive to obtain--and often unavailable. Even if obtainable, this data would most likely lead to imprecise projections as explained in appendix V.

As the following table shows, OMB and CBO have different projections for all three programs through 1987. OMB assumes lower unemployment and inflation rates than CBO for the time period, and OMB assumes that the President's proposed 1983 legislative initiatives will be enacted. (See app. VI for more information on these assumptions.)

a/CBO projections assume legislative savings resulting from the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 but do not include changes proposed by the President's 1983 budget; OMB projections include both the effects of the Reconciliation Act and the President's 1983 proposed legislative changes. One of the President's proposals would replace administrative funding for Food Stamps, AFDC, and Medicaid with a single grant (Combined Welfare Administration) to the States in fiscal year 1983.

We were asked to provide State-by-State information wherever possible for future program growth. Appendix VI shows OMB's and CBO's State-by-State estimate for all three programs in 1984. These State estimates were not derived from the CBO or OMB projection model because neither model is capable of providing individual State projections. The OMB- and CBO-derived State estimates are allocations of projected national totals based on either 1981 actual outlays, past spending trends, or State estimates of future spending. These estimates are accurate to the extent that relative differences among the States in terms of economic factors, population, and other matters affecting the programs remain constant from 1981 to 1984.

OBJECTIVE, SCOPE, AND METHODOLOGY

Our objective was to gather and provide existing data on the Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs. We collected basic program information for fiscal years 1977 through 1981 on a State-by-State basis. We reviewed the data with officials from the Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service and the Department of Health and Human Service's Health Care Financing Administration and Office of Family Assistance. We did not verify the accuracy of agency reported statistics.

For information on projections for future program growth, we talked to officials of these three agencies as well as analysts from CBO and OMB. Although we reviewed the rationale of models used to forecast projections, we did not validate the methodology of any forecasting model.

Our work was limited by time constraints, but we trust the accompanying data will be useful in showing how the programs are administered, how much they have cost, and how many individuals have received benefits from them.

PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION

The Food Stamp, Medicaid, and AFDC Programs are three primary welfare programs sponsored by the Federal Government. In fiscal year 1981 total program costs for the 50 States and the District of Columbia were \$10.2 billion for Food Stamps, \$29.6 billion for Medicaid (Arizona has no Medicaid Program) and \$14.3 billion for AFDC (includes State benefit and administrative costs for AFDC and Medicaid). The three programs are similar in that they supplement with cash or in-kind benefits the incomes of needy households. Also, in the 50 States and the District of Columbia, the same State agency is responsible for administering both the AFDC and Food Stamp Programs. In all but eight States the agency that administers AFDC and Food Stamps also administers Medicaid. The programs are dissimilar in that:

- Food Stamps and Medicaid offer in-kind benefits while AFDC is a cash program.
- Eligibility for Food Stamp benefits is based on an income/resources test; AFDC goes to families that have children and meet an income/resource test; Medicaid goes to categorically and--at the option of the States--medically needy individuals.
- Food stamp eligibility and benefit levels are uniform at the national level. States have broad parameters in which to define eligibility criteria and benefit levels for AFDC and Medicaid.
- Except for a portion of State administrative expenses, the Food Stamp Program is totally federally funded. States fund a large portion of the AFDC and Medicaid Programs.

Food Stamps

The Food Stamp Program, authorized by the Food Stamp Act of 1964 (7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.) helps low-income households improve their diets by providing them with coupons for purchasing food. Food stamp eligibility and benefit levels are based upon Federal standards, with the States responsible for certifying eligibility and disbursing coupons. The Federal Government pays 100 percent of the Food Stamp benefit as well as between 50-60 percent of the State's administrative expenses.

Medicaid

Medicaid, authorized by title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1396), is a federally aided, State-administered program providing medical assistance to certain categories of low-income persons. Each State designs and operates its own program within certain Federal guidelines and requirements.

The Federal Government now pays, depending on State per capita income, between 50-78 percent of each State's Medicaid service costs and either 50 percent or 75 percent of most State administrative costs.

Each State's program must offer a core of prescribed services including inpatient and outpatient hospital, laboratory and x-ray, physicians', and family planning services. Optional services may include eyeglasses, drugs, dental care, and inpatient psychiatric care. For both mandatory and optional services, States are allowed to limit the amount, duration, and scope of coverage.

As with services, eligibility for Medicaid varies substantially from State to State. Each Medicaid program must cover categorically needy--persons such as those receiving AFDC benefit payments. However, States have the option to extend Medicaid assistance to medically needy persons--those whose incomes are large enough to disqualify them from cash assistance but not large enough to pay for medical care. Approximately 60 percent of the States offer some type of Medicaid coverage to this expanded eligibility group.

AFDC

AFDC is authorized by title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601) to assist children deprived of parental support. Under AFDC, beneficiaries receive monthly cash payments financed by both the Federal and State Governments. The Federal share of benefit costs ranges from 50-78 percent. Administrative costs are shared equally by the Federal Government and the States. The States, however, administer the program and may tailor it to meet their individual needs and philosophies within broad Federal parameters. State discretion includes defining need, setting benefit levels, and establishing income and resource limits. As a result, AFDC benefits vary significantly from State to State.

PROGRAM GROWTH

The Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs have all experienced dollar growth during fiscal years 1977-81. Participation rates, however, have remained relatively steady for the AFDC and Medicaid Programs over the same time period and have leveled off for the Food Stamp Program during the last two years.

The following figures show for each of the programs, total program costs (recipient benefit and administrative costs), the percent of total program costs allocated among the States, the total number of recipients, the percent allocation of total recipients among the States, and the annual growth rates for both program costs and recipients. Additionally, the figures show the Federal share of AFDC program costs and the State share of Medicaid costs.

The data shown is for each of the 50 States and the District of Columbia; the territories have not been included. Program costs and program recipients are also displayed regionally. 1/

1/All data was supplied by the relevant administering Federal agencies. Because the volume of data was so large, we could not verify the accuracy of these agency reported statistics because of time restraints.


FIGURE 1FOOD STAMP PROGRAM COSTS

1977 - 1981




MEDICAID PROGRAM COSTS

1977 - 1981




FIGURE 5Food Stamp Program Costs and Participation by Region

DIFFERENCES IN BENEFIT LEVELS AMONG STATES

Income maintenance benefits vary widely from State to State. For the AFDC and Medicaid Programs, States are allowed discretion within broad Federal guidelines to establish standards of need and to choose program options. Also, the Federal Government's share of AFDC and Medicaid benefit costs varies depending on the State's per capita income. Food Stamp eligibility and benefits are based on uniform national standards and are not subject to State discretion. The Federal Government pays for all Food Stamp benefits. Program benefits are based on the following:

- Food Stamps - Food Stamp benefit levels are based on the Department of Agriculture's "Thrifty Food Plan," the sum determined by the Department to be sufficient to buy an adequate, low-cost diet. If otherwise eligible, the amount of benefit a household receives is dependent on the size of the household and its income after certain deductions.
- AFDC - In AFDC each State sets its own need standard both in terms of items of subsistence (food, housing, etc.) and amounts of money allowed to cover them. The standard of need represents the cost of meeting basic living needs for all applicants or recipients. The benefit amount in some States is the full standard of need minus income after deductions. Other States pay only a percent of the standard minus income after deductions.
- Medicaid - States having Medicaid are required to cover certain categorically needy individuals, generally those receiving AFDC or Supplemental Security Income, for certain basic medical services. Other than those persons and services that must be covered, States have the option to cover additional groups of people and provide additional medical services. States in general determine the reimbursement rate for services.

The following figures show the average benefits among States. Figure 32 shows the average benefit to recipients and households for each of the three programs and the Federal matching rate for AFDC and Medicaid. Figure 33 shows maximum monthly potential benefits for a three-person AFDC and Food Stamp household. Figure 34 shows the Medicaid services available State by State.

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN PROGRAM GROWTH,
UNEMPLOYMENT, AND OTHER VARIABLES

As indicated earlier, growth in the Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs results from the interaction of many variables. The Departments of Agriculture and Health and Human Services have developed models to predict future program outlays and participation rates. CBO has also developed models for all three programs.

Food Stamp Program

At the national level a very strong historical relationship exists between unemployment rates and Food Stamp Program participation levels. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate is the most important variable in Agriculture's quarterly food stamp projection model. Other variables in its model are the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate from the prior quarter, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for food consumed at home, and an adjustment factor for legislative changes effected in 1979, specifically the elimination of the Food Stamp purchase requirement.

The combination of these four variables, two of which are unemployment based, has been highly predictive of food stamp participation levels nationally. Knowing the values of these predictor variables for a given quarter, one can estimate the food stamp participation rate for that quarter with a high degree of accuracy. Accurate participation predictions can be made if accurate estimates of unemployment rates and the CPI are provided and if unaccounted for legislative changes do not disrupt their relationship. Based on the current model, a one percentage point increase in the unemployment rate adds approximately 1.1 million people to the Food Stamp Program. Figure 36 shows the historical comparison of participation and unemployment.

Agriculture uses unemployment rate and CPI estimates supplied by OMB as the basis for predicting Food Stamp participation levels. Because the model is quite accurate, the estimates of Food Stamp participation made based on the OMB estimates are about as accurate as the OMB estimates. CBO uses a similar unemployment-based model to develop its estimates of Food Stamp participation levels but uses its own estimates of future unemployment and CPI.

As indicated earlier, legislative changes can have a substantial impact on participation levels, which may alter the unemployment/Food Stamp participation relationship. Both the effect of the elimination of the purchase requirement and the 1981 Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act are evident in Figure 35. The elimination of the purchase requirement added 4.4 million people to the Food Stamp Program according to Agriculture's

RECIPIENTS OF SIMULTANEOUS FOOD STAMP,AFDC, AND MEDICAID BENEFITS

Because the programs have similar eligibility requirements, many Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Program recipients often receive benefits from more than one of these programs. For example, 47 percent of all Food Stamp beneficiaries receive AFDC benefits while 63 percent receive Medicaid assistance. In addition, 75 percent of all AFDC recipients obtain Food Stamps while all are categorically eligible for Medicaid.

This overlapping eligibility means that changes in one program can affect the benefits offered--and the number of recipients covered--by the other two programs. For example, changing AFDC benefit levels will alter Food Stamp benefits because AFDC assistance counts as income when determining Food Stamp benefit levels. Also, changing AFDC eligibility requirements will affect the size of the Medicaid population because all AFDC beneficiaries are automatically eligible for Medicaid.

model. The effect of the 1981 legislation cannot be estimated by the model as yet. Agriculture currently makes a separate calculation to adjust its model-based predictions in accordance with its estimate of the act's impact. The validity of this adjustment cannot be assessed until the effect of the act can be viewed historically.

Neither Agriculture nor CBO try to predict Food Stamp participation levels by State. The ability to make such predictions is restricted for several reasons. First, just as in the national model, future Food Stamp participation levels may be dependent upon estimates of future State unemployment and CPI. Second, not only would State Food Stamp demand estimates be subject to error due to unforeseen national policy changes, but they are also subject to State policy changes. If the State chooses to increase AFDC benefits, for example, food stamp costs might decrease. Since it is difficult to predict State policy changes, it is also difficult to predict Food Stamp demand.

Finally, although we have evidence to indicate that, nationally, unemployment, CPI, and the Food Stamp participation rate are correlated, we cannot be sure that the relationship would be stable across States. It may be that factors such as industrialization, population density, and median family income affect the relationship between Food Stamp participation and unemployment. Thus while unemployment may affect Food Stamp demand in some States, it may not in others.


AFDC Program

The unemployment rate is a factor in Health and Human Service's predictive model of AFDC caseload, but it is of somewhat less significance and has a more complex relationship than is the case with Food Stamps. While, in general, an increase in unemployment rate has led to an increase in AFDC caseload in subsequent months, a corresponding decline in the unemployment rate does not necessarily reduce caseload to the same degree. This is due to policy provisions that allow AFDC recipients to remain in the program once they have returned to work. Such provisions include child care, work expense allowances, and an income disregard.

The overall relationship is further complicated by special elective programs. Some States have unemployed parents programs. As the name implies these programs are more directly affected by unemployment rates than is the AFDC basic caseload. Inflation, programs to reduce payment errors, and numerous provisions of the 1981 Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act also affect caseload and overall program costs.

factor. The validity of this model to predict State expenditures is only as good as the estimates of changes in Medicaid population size, utilization changes, CPI variations, and policy impacts.

Because of the complexity of factors involved and the variety in State programs, predicting future AFDC caseload and cost is extremely difficult on a nationwide basis. It is even more difficult on a State-by-State basis for many of the same reasons that State Food Stamp predictions are tenuous. These reasons include (1) lack of State-level data on significant variables (such as CPI), (2) State policy provisions related to the programs and anticipated changes, and (3) insufficient past study of the relationship between each State's unique environment (industrialization, etc.) and factors relating to AFDC costs.

Medicaid Program

Of the Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs, the latter is the least related to unemployment. Only a portion of Medicaid recipients are potentially affected by unemployment--the AFDC beneficiaries. The other population groups covered by Medicaid--the aged and the disabled--are unlikely to be affected by unemployment rate fluctuations.

CBO's model to predict Medicaid expenditures considers (1) anticipated population changes among the major groups covered (AFDC recipients, the aged, and disabled), (2) historical patterns of services use, and (3) CPI related to medical services. Unemployment only relates to the model through the estimation of AFDC population size.

Like AFDC, Medicaid benefits vary widely across States. In addition to mandatory program services, States provide up to 31 optional services.

State-by-State assessments of future costs are complicated by difficulties in pinpointing prior yearly costs by State. Total payments to a State often overlap years and include adjustments for prior over- or underpayments. It is extremely difficult, therefore, to determine a precise figure for Medicaid costs for a given year. The inability to assess past cost by State on a yearly basis results in a lack of good data upon which to base future predictions.

CBO collects State estimates of Medicaid expenditures for the future year, but in the past these projections have proven to be unreliable. The only State-by-State estimate CBO develops is calculated by (1) totaling all State outlays for a given year, (2) determining each State's proportion of this total, and (3) applying each State's proportion to its predicted estimate of total program costs. CBO does not feel that these estimates are reliable.

Health and Human Services uses a Medicaid cost model on a State-by-State basis that is very similar to CBO's nationwide prediction model. As in the CBO model, unemployment is not a

CBO and OMB projections

As discussed earlier, the economic variable strongly affects the cost of the Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Programs. The following table shows that OMB's economic assumptions are more optimistic than CBO's.

Impact of Swap on the States

As described earlier (see pp. 5 and 6) neither CBO nor OMB project Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid costs on a State-by-State basis. However, to illustrate how the swap's first year might affect individual States, both agencies have allocated their 1984 national outlays projections among the States, based on 1981 actual outlays, past spending trends, or State estimates of future spending. Neither CBO nor OMB claims that its figures indicate how the swap will affect individual States because changes in local economic and programmatic factors may be different in 1981 and 1984. The following table lists CBO's and OMB's 1984 State-by-State outlays.

PROJECTIONS FOR FUTURE PROGRAM COSTS

Projections for future Food Stamp, AFDC, and Medicaid Program costs vary considerably between OMB and CBO. The differences are primarily due to the different economic and programmatic assumptions which each agency uses, although as appendix V shows, both use similar projection models. CBO projects that growth for each of the three programs will range from 27 percent (AFDC) to 76 percent (Medicaid) between 1982 and 1987. OMB, on the other hand, foresees decreases in both Food Stamps and AFDC along with modest growth in the Medicaid Program.
