Dear Madam Chairwoman:

This report responds to your request for information on selected issues involving intercollegiate athletics. In your request, you noted that the Subcommittee was concerned about the numerous inquiries it received from other Members of the Congress, state legislators, and the public. These inquiries focused on certain issues related to intercollegiate athletics, which generates over \$1 billion in interstate commerce each year.

You asked that we (1) review data on the revenues and expenses of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and its member schools' athletic departments, (2) develop profile data on the gender and race/ethnicity of staff members in five selected positions in schools' athletic departments, and (3) develop compensation data for these staff. You also asked that we analyze the profile and compensation data by comparing information for schools designated as historically black schools by the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, to similar information for the other schools in the largest of NCAA's three divisions—division I.

On April 9, 1992, we testified before the Subcommittee on our preliminary results. This report includes the information contained in our testimony and additional information concerning our final results.

Results in Brief

The NCAA had revenues of \$152.5 million and expenses of \$151.3 million for the year ending August 31, 1991. Its major revenue source was television fees (\$118.5 million) and its largest expense was the distribution of revenue to member schools—\$79.2 million. The NCAA's larger member schools' athletic departments averaged \$9.7 million in revenues and \$9.6 million in expenses during fiscal year 1989—although 40 percent of the

schools reported budget deficits. The schools' largest revenue source was ticket sales (35 percent), and salaries and wages their largest expense (23 percent).

Across division I schools, men held all the positions of athletic director, head football coach, and head coach for men's basketball, except in one case where a woman was the athletic director. Women more often held positions as head of women's athletic programs and head coach for women's basketball, although 38 percent of the head coaches for women's basketball were men. Except for personnel we surveyed at historically black schools, athletic department positions were mostly held by nonminorities at the other division I schools. Minorities were most frequently represented as head coaches for men's basketball—19 percent.

Average compensation for personnel in the five selected athletic department positions, including their school base salary, additional school benefits, and income from sources outside the school, varied considerably. Head football coaches had the highest average total compensation—\$114,759, while head coaches for women's basketball had the lowest—\$44,996. Head coaches for women's basketball always had lower average compensation than head coaches for men's basketball. However, when comparing compensation for women and men who were head coaches for women's basketball, women had a higher average total compensation—\$47,356 versus \$41,279, respectively.

Background

Founded in 1906, the NCAA is a voluntary, unincorporated association that administers intercollegiate athletics. Its membership consists of over 800 4-year colleges and universities. All NCAA policies and activities are controlled by its member schools, which meet at an annual convention in January. Voting authority of each member rests with its chief executive officer, normally the school president or chancellor.

NCAA member schools belong to one of three divisions. A school's classification is generally based on items such as the number of sports sponsored. Typically, schools with the largest number of athletic programs and facilities belong to division I and schools with smaller programs are in divisions II or III. In addition, division I schools are subdivided into three categories, I-A, I-AA, and I-AAA, with schools that have the larger football programs generally in division I-A.

NCAA's charter allows it to study all phases of intercollegiate athletics. In this capacity, the NCAA issued reports on minority hiring and gender equity in January and March 1992, respectively. It also conducts a survey every 4 years relating to the revenues and expenses of its member schools' athletic activities for the NCAA's three divisions. The last report was issued in October 1990 and covered revenues and expenses for the 4 years ending in fiscal year 1989.

Scope and Methodology

We analyzed NCAA data for revenues and expenses of the NCAA and its member schools. The NCAA gave us revenue and expense data for its year ending August 31, 1991. We also used the NCAA's October 1990 report to develop data on the revenue and expenses of the member schools' athletic departments. We focused on revenue and expense totals from I-A schools, where the survey response rate was the best—82 percent (87 of 106 schools).

We developed a questionnaire to obtain information on gender, race/ethnicity, and compensation data for the athletic departments of the 298 schools in division I. The questionnaire was mailed to the athletic director at each school and asked for information for the 1990-91 academic year for five positions: (1) athletic director, (2) head of women's athletic programs, (3) head football coach, (4) head coach for men's basketball, and (5) head coach for women's basketball. (Information on our questionnaire methodology is in app. I.) With your concurrence, we pledged confidentiality to the schools that responded to our questionnaire. Eighty-seven percent of the schools (259) answered at least one question, including 16 of the 19 historically black schools in division I.

We performed separate analyses for individuals who (1) held only one of the five positions surveyed and (2) concurrently held more than one of these positions. Our analysis comparing results for historically black schools to the other division I schools that was included in our testimony is contained in appendix II. The results for historically black schools are based on a maximum of 16 schools; therefore, caution must be exercised in using these results because of the limited number of schools.

This letter summarizes the results for the 259 division I schools responding to our survey. Appendixes III and IV contain the results for each question to which schools responded that one person either (1) occupied each of the five athletic positions surveyed or (2) concurrently occupied more than one of the five positions, respectively. These two appendixes also

include the ranges between the minimum and maximum income amounts cited. The ranges for some income items were extremely wide and this should be considered in evaluating the averages cited.

We made no attempt to adjust the compensation data we received to reflect issues such as an individual's experience in athletics, years of service in a particular position, size of the school, or size of the athletic programs. In addition, we did not verify respondents' answers.

Appendix V contains information from the NCAA's annual report on its revenues and expenses for the years ending August 31, 1990, and August 31, 1991. We did not verify this information.

Our work was conducted between June 1991 and March 1992 in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. Other GAO products on intercollegiate athletics are listed opposite the inside back cover of this report.

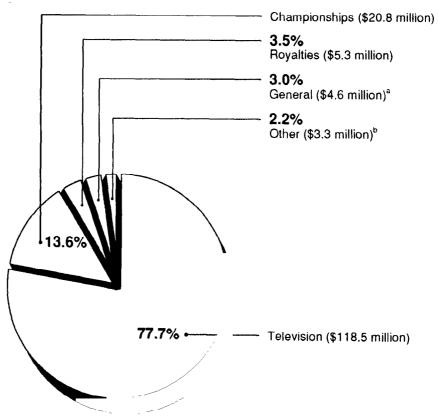
Revenues and Expenses of the NCAA and Its Member Schools

NCAA's Revenues and Expenses

The NCAA reported revenues of \$152.5 million and expenses of \$151.3 million, resulting in a surplus of \$1.2 million, for the year ending August 31, 1991.

Figure 1 shows that television fees—primarily for broadcasting rights—was the NCAA's major revenue source: \$118.5 million or nearly 78 percent of the total. Revenues of \$20.8 million from sports championship activities—such as its annual basketball tournament—followed, providing about 14 percent of total revenue.

Figure 1: NCAA's Revenues

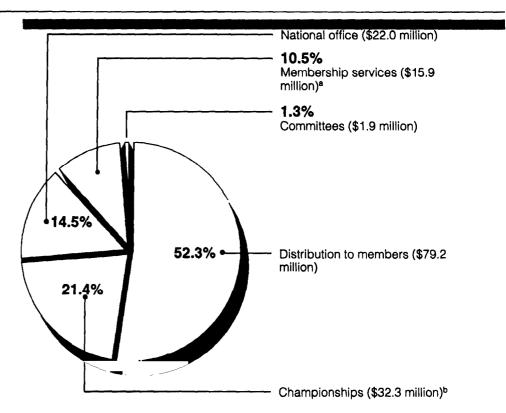

The majority of the NCAA's expenses (\$79.2 million) was for the distribution of revenues to member schools for activities, such as grants-in-aid and sports sponsorships. The next largest expense category, as shown in figure 2, was to support its championship activities (\$32.3 million).

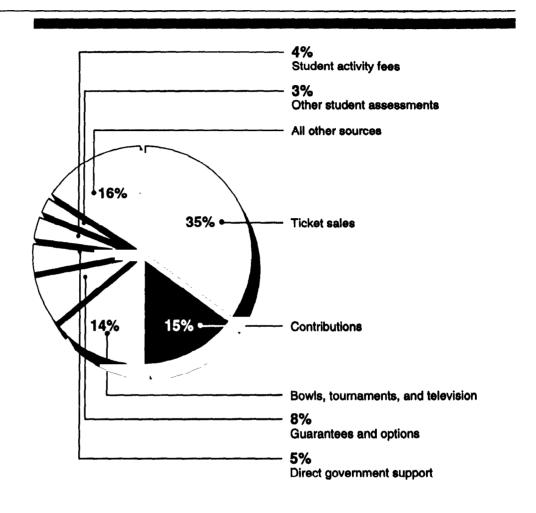

Member Schools' Revenues and Expenses

The athletic departments of the NCAA's division I-A member schools averaged \$9.7 million in revenues and \$9.6 million in expenses for fiscal year 1989. Fifty-five percent of these schools reported a surplus, 40 percent reported a deficit, and 5 percent reported a balanced budget.

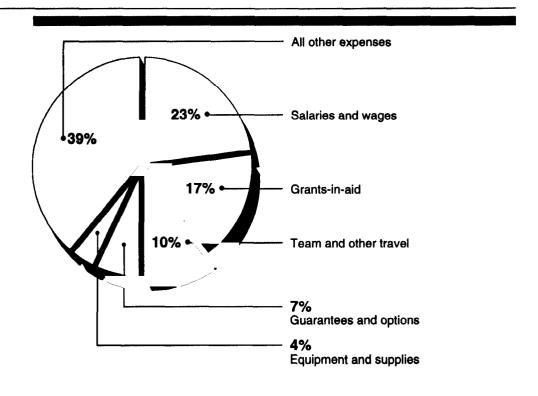
Ticket sales was the largest source of revenue, accounting for 35 percent of revenues at division I-A schools. Figure 3 shows the schools' revenue by source for fiscal year 1989.

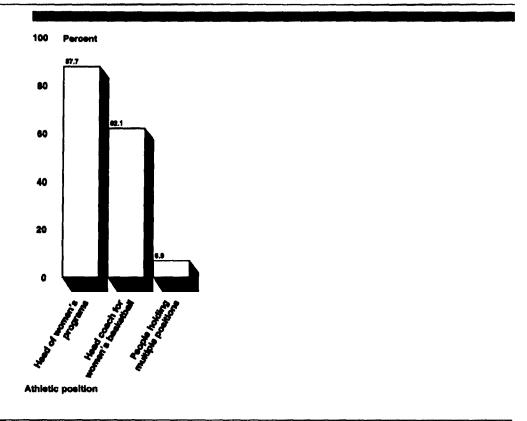
Figure 4: Division I-A Schools' Expenses

Salaries and wages, including fringe benefits, were the largest single expense for division I-A schools, accounting for 23 percent of operating expenses for fiscal year 1989. Figure 4 shows the schools' expenses by category.

Gender Profile

Only one woman in division I served as athletic director, and no women coached football or men's basketball for the schools responding to our questionnaire. Figure 5 shows that women were more frequently represented as the head of women's programs (88 percent). In addition, women held 62 percent of the positions as head coaches for women's basketball and represented about 7 percent of those having multiple positions.

Figure 5: Women's Representation in Selected Positions at Division I Schools

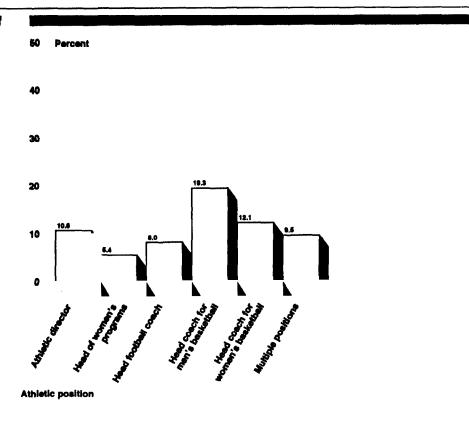


Minority Profile

Except for historically black schools, minorities rarely held athletic department positions at division I schools. (Figure II.2 shows the results for minorities as a percentage of staff at other than historically black schools in division I.) Figure 6, which includes the results for historically black schools, shows that head coach of men's basketball was the position most frequently held by minorities—about 19 percent of the positions for the schools responding to our questionnaire.

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Figure 6: Minorities as a Percentage of Staff in Selected Athletic Positions at Division I Schools



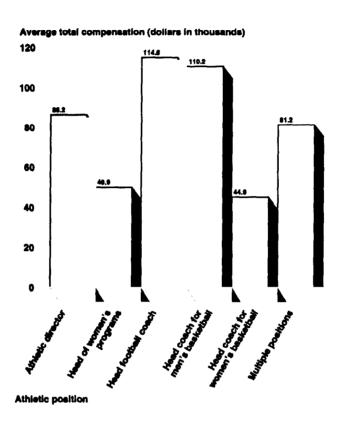
The NCAA found similar results in its study on minority hiring.

Average Compensation Received by Personnel in Selected Athletic Positions The average amount cited for each income item that follows is the average amount earned by those persons receiving and reporting such income for the 259 schools responding to our questionnaire. The ranges for some income items were extremely wide and this should be considered in evaluating the averages cited. (See apps. III and IV.) Many schools reported that not all persons in the surveyed positions received additional school benefits or outside income.

Total Income

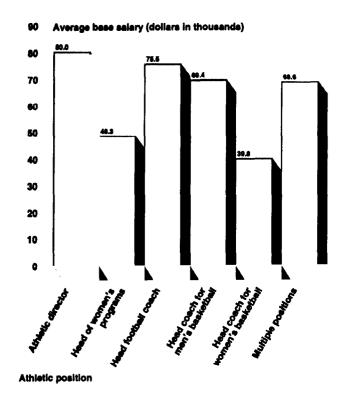
Figure 7: Average Total Compensation for Selected Athletic Positions at Division I Schools

Head football coaches had the highest average total compensation—\$114,759. Figure 7 also shows that head coaches for women's basketball earned an average total compensation of \$44,996—the lowest of the positions surveyed—compared to \$110,180 for head coaches for men's basketball. Thus, head coaches for women's basketball earned 41 percent of the average total compensation for head coaches for men's basketball.

Base Salaries

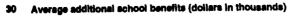
Figure 8: Average Base Salaries for Selected Athletic Positions at Division I Schools

Athletic directors had the highest average base salary—\$80,047—at division I schools. Figure 8 also shows that head coaches for women's basketball earned an average base salary of \$39,838—the lowest of the positions surveyed—compared to \$69,390 for head coaches for men's basketball. Thus, head coaches for women's basketball earned 57 percent of the average base salary for head coaches for men's basketball.

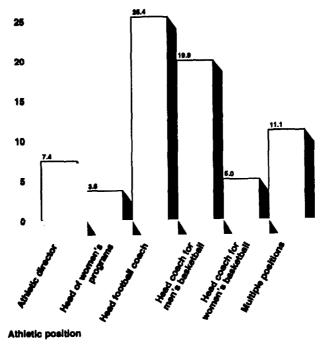


Additional School Benefits

Head football coaches had the highest additional school benefits—\$25,431—for those earning such benefits at division I schools. These benefits can represent items such as club memberships and housing assistance. Figure 9 also shows that head coaches for women's basketball earned average additional school benefits of \$5,003 compared to \$19,955 for head coaches for men's basketball. Thus, head coaches for women's basketball earned 25 percent of the average additional school benefits for head coaches for men's basketball.

Figure 9: Average Additional School Benefits for Selected Athletic Positions at Division I Schools

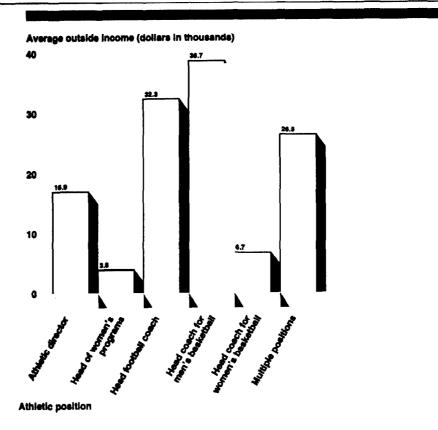




Outside Income

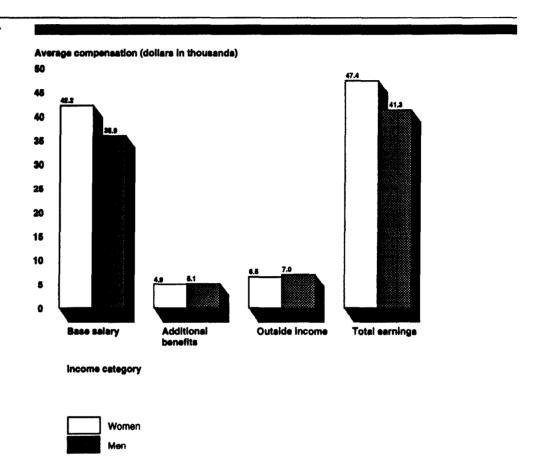
Head coaches for men's basketball had the highest average income—\$38,686—for those receiving income from sources outside the schools. Figure 10 shows that head coaches for women's basketball had average outside earnings of \$6,651; 17 percent of the average outside income for head coaches for men's basketball.

Comparative Compensation for Women and Men Coaching Women's Basketball We also compared the earnings for women and men who coach women's basketball at division I schools. We found that women had a higher average base salary and total compensation than men at division I schools, although men earned slightly more in average additional school benefits and outside income. Figure 11 shows these results.

GAO's Questionnaire Methodology

We developed and mailed a questionnaire to the athletic directors at the 298 schools in the NCAA's division I. We asked them to provide the requested information for their position, as well as for four other positions within the athletic department. These other positions were (1) head football coach, (2) head coach for men's basketball, (3) head coach for women's basketball, and (4) head of women's athletic programs.¹

Specifically, we requested gender, race/ethnicity, and income data for each of the five positions. We further defined income data with three variables or questions concerning an individual's (1) base salary, (2) special or additional school benefits, and (3) outside compensation.

We asked that earnings from nonathletic activities, such as teaching, be excluded. We specified that the income information we were seeking reflect the compensation an individual received as a result of holding that particular athletic position. We also requested that the respondents identify whether any individual held more than one of the five surveyed positions concurrently. We then analyzed the multiple position results separately.

We defined base salary to include an individual's base pay and any additional salary or bonuses. We stated that special or additional school benefits included items such as housing assistance, free transportation (for example, use of a car), free tickets to sporting events, and club memberships.² We defined outside earnings as any compensation from sources outside the school, such as income earned from product endorsements (for example, shoe advertisements), speaking engagements, and radio or television shows.

We pledged confidentiality for all responses with the Subcommittee's written consent. As such, we agreed to only report aggregate data, with no identification of the schools that responded.

Response Rate

We received responses from 264 of the 298 schools (88 percent) we surveyed. However, 5 of the responding schools declined to answer any of the questions we asked. Therefore, we had 259 usable questionnaires. The respondents were broken down into two groups: (1) 248 schools who sent

back questionnaires with both demographic and income data, although a few of these schools did not answer all three of the income questions; and (2) 11 schools that provided demographic data only.

Special Considerations

We excluded responses for certain positions at three schools for our analyses of both demographic and income data. These three schools had more than one individual who held a particular position during our survey timeframe. For example, we excluded the responses for one school where two individuals shared a position as co-coaches during the entire 1990-91 academic year.

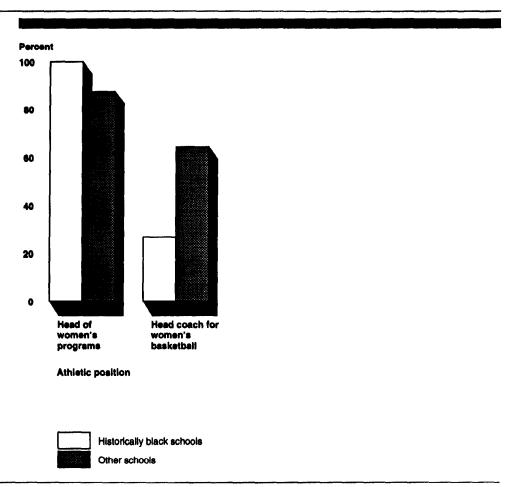
We also excluded from our income analysis the responses of individuals who indicated they received no special or additional school benefits or outside income. As a result, we confined this part of our analysis to only those individuals who received compensation in these two categories.

The following information is from our testimony before the Subcommittee on April 9, 1992. This information is based on the results from the 259 division I schools that responded to our questionnaire. It is also based on the results for individuals who held only one of the five positions we surveyed and compares the results for historically black schools to the other division I schools.

Gender Profile

At the schools responding to our questionnaire, only one woman in division I served as athletic director, and no women coached football or men's basketball. Figure II.1 shows that women were more frequently represented as the head of women's programs. However, this figure also shows that women comprised a lower percentage (about 27 percent versus 64 percent) of head coaches of women's basketball at historically black schools compared to the other division I schools.

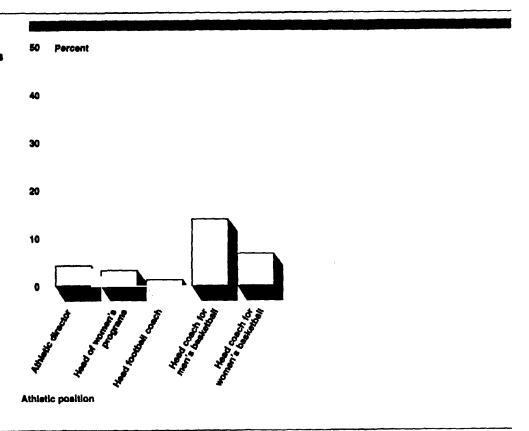
Figure II.1: Women as a Percentage of Heads of Women's Programs and Head Coaches of Women's Basketball



Minority Profile

Among the schools responding to our questionnaire, all athletic department positions at historically black schools were occupied by minorities, except at one division I school where a white male was the head coach for women's basketball. However, as shown in figure II.2, minorities rarely held these positions at other division I schools. Head coach for men's basketball was the position most frequently held by minorities—about 14 percent of the positions.

The average amount cited for each income item that follows is the average amount received by those persons reporting such income. Many schools reported that not all persons holding these positions received additional school benefits or outside income. This is particularly true for historically black schools, where only a small number of athletic personnel received any additional school benefits or outside income.

Base Salaries

At historically black schools, head football coaches had the highest average base salary—\$49,522—while athletic directors at the other division I schools had the highest average base salary—\$82,355. Table II.1 shows that individuals occupying the five athletic positions at historically black schools earned a lower average base salary than those individuals in similar positions at the other schools.

The number of responding schools that said their staff received and reported a base salary for the five athletic positions (in consecutive order) at historically black schools were 10, 3, 12, 16, and 15; and at the other division I schools 134, 120, 153, 228, and 215.

Additional School Benefits

For those earning additional school benefits in division I schools, head football coaches had the highest benefits—\$19,968 and \$25,568—at historically black and other division I schools, respectively. These benefits can represent items such as club memberships and housing assistance. Table II.2 shows that individuals occupying the head of women's programs, head football coach, and head coach for men's basketball positions at historically black schools earned less additional school benefits than those in similar positions at the other division I schools. However, athletic directors and head coaches of women's basketball at historically black schools had higher average additional school benefits than those at the other schools.

Outside Income

Head coaches for men's basketball had the highest average income for those receiving income from sources outside the schools, ranging from \$5,000 at historically black schools to \$39,338 at the other division I schools. Table II.3 shows that individuals occupying the five athletic positions at historically black schools had lower average outside earnings than those in similar positions at the other schools.

Total Income

Head football coaches had the highest average total compensation: \$55,181 at historically black schools and \$120,258 at the other division I schools. Table II.4 shows that individuals occupying the five athletic positions at historically black schools had lower average total compensation than those in similar positions at the other division I schools.

Women's Basketball

As requested by your office, we also compared the earnings for women and men who coach women's basketball at historically black and the other division I schools. We found that men had earned slightly more in average total compensation (\$32,331) than women (\$31,651) at historically black schools. However, women had a higher average total compensation (\$47,871) than men (\$42,706) at the other division I schools. Table II.5 shows these results.

Single-Position Responses to GAO'S Survey of Division I Schools

This appendix contains the answers to questions for personnel who held just one of the five athletic department positions we surveyed. Appendix IV contains the answers for personnel who concurrently held more than one of the five positions (multiple positions) in the athletic department.

The number of responses for the three income variables (base salary, additional school benefits, and outside income) in this appendix represent the results for only those who reported the dollar value of the income item. As such we excluded from our analysis those who said the value was zero or those that declined to provide the value. The percentages cited may not always add to 100 percent due to rounding.

Note J: Distribution of Revenues

In November 1989, the NCAA entered into an agreement with CBS Sports, Inc., for television rights to the division I men's basketball championship and 17 other meets and tournaments for the period 1991 through 1997. Television revenue no longer is recorded for any championship, but rather is shown as a separate line item.

In August 1990, the NCAA executive committee voted to discontinue the traditional distribution of net receipts of championships among the participating schools in favor of a plan, developed by a special committee, designed to apportion the moneys from the CBS contract more equitably among the membership.
