# Status of Obligations at Selected Agencies

Dear Senator Hatfield:

This is the second in a series of responses to your March 30, 1988, letter in which you expressed concern that the executive agencies may not be planning to fully obligate funds for programs, projects, and activities. Specifically, you were interested in the items identified in the committees' reports accompanying the fiscal year 1988 appropriation bills (including those in the Continuing Resolution of Appropriations for 1988--Public Law 100-202).

You asked us to determine whether the executive agencies were in fact obligating or planning to obligate the selected items referred to in a March 15, 1988, Office of Management and Budget (OMB) memorandum. Our initial work involved studying and reporting on the process OMB used to develop the March 15, 1988, list of committee report projects. We provided you the results of that assessment in our May 13, 1988, letter.

As agreed with your office, this report provides the agencies' statements of intent as to whether they are planning to use the funds as specified by the committee reports and each project's current obligational status. Our work in this second phase covered the projects on OMB's list with partial or no obligations for the Departments of Agriculture (USDA), Commerce, Transportation, Defense, and the Interior. Appendix I includes a more extensive description of our scope and methodology.

Although the five agencies have provided us information regarding their intent to spend the full amount designated for the specified projects, the position on individual items may change. According to OMB officials, agency intentions are not necessarily administration intentions in all cases. They told us that the question of administration intentions is an evolving matter which will be determined on a project-by-project basis.

Notwithstanding the general intent of the five agencies to spend funds for the designated purposes, we found a number of instances where the agencies were not planning to follow through. For most of these cases, agency officials said they were planning to request congressional approval to reprogram these funds for other purposes.

A summary of the results of our work at the five selected agencies follows.

- -- Department of Agriculture. Its officials informed us that, except for 5 of the 58 projects, they planned to obligate all funds as directed by the congressional reports. As of May 20, 1988, they had obligated \$35.7 million out of \$143.1 million, or 25 percent. The five exceptions are listed below:
  - 1. Vegetable Laboratory, Charleston, South Carolina. USDA expects to carry over \$25,000 to fiscal year 1989.
  - Information and Technology Center, Gonzaga University, Washington. USDA is reviewing relevance to agricultural issues.
  - Picron-Peck Process Research, University of Illinois. A grant will not be made without assurance of matching funds from nonfederal sources.
  - 4. Nantahala National Forest, North Carolina. USDA is reviewing the need to transfer these funds on an emergency basis to perform fire recovery work in other Forest Service regions.
  - 5. Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area, West Virginia. USDA expects to carry over \$100,000 to fiscal year 1989.

Appendix II provides additional information on USDA's projects.

-- Department of Commerce. Although Commerce officials stated that they intended to obligate all the funds in question, we found that there were two categories of major exceptions--both concerning the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). First, 15 items considered to be of low priority and not central to NOAA's mission were proposed for reprogramming. Second, an across-the-board dollar reduction of 6.5 percent on all NOAA items on the list was proposed.

Agency officials told us that this reduction is necessary to prevent furloughs of agency personnel. Together, these exceptions accounted for 79 percent of the Commerce items on the list and 25 percent of the dollars involved. At the time of our study, Commerce had obligated \$21.1 million of the total \$71.8 million, or 29.4 percent.

Additional details on Commerce's items are included in appendix III.

-- Department of Defense. Our work covered three Department of Defense components--Army, Navy, and Corps of Engineers.

Army officials told us that they planned to obligate the funds for all items except the Maxi-Cube Cargo Handling system. Their reason for this exception was that the funds for the system had not been authorized for fiscal year 1988.

Navy officials are not planning to obligate funds for four of their seven items.

- AN/SQR-17A Processors for the Mobile In-Shore Undersea Warfare Group. Funds were appropriated but not authorized.
- MK-92 Cort Fire Control System Upgrade. These funds are being held as resources available for reprogramming.
- 3. Rankine Cycle Energy Recovery (RACER). The project has been terminated.
- Navy Remote Ocean Sensing System (NROSS). The project has been terminated.

Corps of Engineers officials are not planning to use funds designated for three of their six projects.

- New York State Barge Canal, New York. Funds will not be obligated because the canal is not an integral part of the nation's inland navigation system.
- 2. Wallisville Lake, Texas. Funds will not be obligated because it is a single-purpose water supply project with nonstandard cost sharing.

 Maumee Bay, Ohio. The project was authorized in a prior bill and funded only for preconstruction design and engineering in the latest appropriations act.

At the time of our study, Defense had obligated about \$11 million out of \$438.3 million, or 2.5 percent of the funds in question. Appendix IV provides additional information on these projects.

- -- Department of the Interior. Department officials stated that they intended to fully obligate the funds.

  However, we found that, at the Bureau level, at least 5 of 67 items totaling \$9.7 million (4 percent of the funds) were being considered for rescission, repeal, or amendment. They are as follows:
  - 1. Mariposa Waste Disposal Facility.
  - 2. Bicentennial Lighthouse Fund.
  - 3. Choctaw Central School Construction.
  - 4. Marine Minerals Tech. Center.
  - 5. Wilkes-Barre.

At the time of our study, Interior had obligated \$77 million out of \$250.4 million, or 31 percent of the available funds. Interior's projects are further discussed in appendix V.

- -- Department of Transportation. Department officials informed us that except for 3 of the 36 projects, Transportation intends to obligate all funds as directed by the congressional reports. As of May 31, 1988, the Department had obligated \$107.5 million out of \$838.5 million, or 13 percent. The three exceptions are listed below:
  - 1. Establish or upgrade airport surveillance radars at Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport, Virginia; Nantucket, Massachusetts; Gainesville, Florida; and Missoula International Airport, Montana. The Department stated that \$38 million is insufficient to establish or upgrade airport surveillance radars at all four of the named locations. Therefore, the Department is considering various alternatives, including not doing the work at all four locations.

- 2. Installation of BRITE Display at Gary, Indiana. Department officials stated that \$95,000 is insufficient to procure and install BRITE radar at the Gary, Indiana, tower. Therefore, the Department will not obligate the funds until the additional needed funds are obtained. The additional amounts are being requested through reprogramming.
- 3. Alteration of the CSX railroad bridge, Pascagoula, Mississippi, and the Norfolk and Southern bridge, Hannibal, Missouri. A draft final report on the Hannibal bridge indicates that the bridge will qualify for alteration under the Truman-Hobbs Act. The CSX bridge, based on preliminary study, does not qualify for federal funding under Truman-Hobbs.

In addition there are three projects, not involving specific dollar earmarkings, for which the department does not plan to fully comply with report language.

- 1. Coast Guard Yard, Curtis Bay, Maryland. The staffing ceiling for industrial activities will not be removed because the Coast Guard intends to close the yard within a few years.
- 2. Federal Railroad Administration District Office, Bangor, Maine. Although there presently are no plans to close the office, the Department does not plan to increase staff.
- 3. Rulemaking on Charter Bus Regulation. The Department will proceed with proposed changes that do not conflict with the Urban Mass Transportation Act.

# RELATED ISSUES

In response to your specific questions relating to the closing of weather stations, NOAA officials said they do not plan to reduce personnel or close any weather stations during fiscal year 1988. In fact, some of the proposals for reprogramming or for offsetting budget reductions (noted previously) were designed to provide funds to prevent these actions. However, the Department of Commerce's fiscal year 1989 budget submission to the Congress includes a request to eliminate 125 weather service staff positions and to close several weather stations.

As you requested, we did not obtain official agency comments. However, the views of responsible agency officials were obtained during the course of our work and were incorporated as appropriate.

As agreed with your office, unless you publicly announce the contents of this report earlier, we will not distribute it until 30 days from its date. At that time, we will send copies to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget; the Secretaries of the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Transportation, Defense, and the Interior; interested congressional committees; and other parties. # OBJECTIVES, SCOPE, AND METHODOLOGY

The purpose of our work was to determine the obligational status and intent of selected agencies to incur additional obligations for programs, projects, and activities identified in a list attached to a March 15, 1988, OMB memorandum to agency heads. Our work was done at the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Defense, Transportation, and the Interior during the period May 11, 1988, through May 31, 1988. As agreed with your office, we concentrated on ascertaining the status of projects on OMB's list with partial or no obligations and agencies' intentions to obligate any remaining funds.

# In general, we

- -- reviewed OMB's March 15, 1988, list of items which were included in committee reports for fiscal year 1988 but were not requested in the President's Budget;
- -- traced those items to the conference report in the Continuing Resolution and then to the respective department's appropriation bill and fiscal year 1988 committee reports to verify that the list was complete;
- -- identified items on the OMB list which were not fully obligated;
- -- updated the obligation figures on a selective basis for items that had not been fully obligated;
- -- obtained copies of each department's reply to OMB's March 15, 1988, request for a separate description of agency plans to fully, partially, or not follow each of the congressional actions identified by OMB;
- -- interviewed various agency budget officers who prepared obligation status reports to determine how the reports were developed and the current obligation status; and
- -- reviewed documentation such as grants, contracts, proposals, accounting records, correspondence, and budget narratives to identify the current status of the amounts reported as obligated. In some cases where noncompliance was indicated, we traced the items to reprogramming requests submitted to OMB and the Congress.

We prepared schedules which present the obligation status of funds as of our review date and the agencies' intentions for future obligations. These schedules are included in appendixes II through VI.

- -- Establish or upgrade airport surveillance radars at Charlottesville-Albemarle Airport, Virginia; Nantucket, Massachusetts; Gainesville, Florida; and Missoula International Airport, Montana. The Department stated that \$38 million is insufficient to establish or upgrade airport surveillance radars at all four of the named locations. Therefore, the Department is considering various alternatives, including not doing the work at all four locations.
- Installation of BRITE Display at Gary, Indiana. Department officials stated that \$95,000 is insufficient to procure and install BRITE radar at the Gary, Indiana, tower. Therefore, the Department will not obligate the funds until the additional needed funds are obtained. The additional amounts are being requested through reprogramming.

— Alteration of the CSX railroad bridge, Pascagoula, Mississippi, and the Norfolk and Southern bridge, Hannibal, Missouri. A draft final report on the Hannibal bridge indicates that the bridge will qualify for alteration under the Truman-Hobbs Act. The CSX bridge, based on preliminary study, does not qualify for federal funding under Truman-Hobbs.

In addition there are three projects, not involving specific dollar earmarkings, for which the department does not plan to fully comply with report language.

- -- Coast Guard Yard, Curtis Bay, Maryland. The staffing ceiling for industrial activities will not be removed because the Coast Guard intends to close the yard within a few years.
- Federal Railroad Administration District Office, Bangor, Maine. Although there presently are no plans to close the office, the Department does not plan to increase staff.
- -- Rulemaking on Charter Bus Regulation. The Department will proceed with proposed changes that do not conflict with the Urban Mass Transportation Act.
