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

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Your letter of September 7, 1972, requested us to ascertain the amount of fees and other payments to 70 Veterans 1/2 Administration (VA) physicians by Florida Blue Shield under part B of the Medicare program during the first 8 months of calendar year 1972. As agreed with your office, we have included information on (1) Blue Shield payments to the physicians under other health programs and (2) payments to the physicians by the University of Miami.

The physicians were employed at the VA hospital in Miami, Florida. We identified 11 of the physicians as employed full time during all or part of the period January through September 1972 and the remaining 59 as employed part time during all or part of the same period. According to VA records the part-time designations ranged from one-eighth VA employment to seven-eighths VA employment. A VA policy statement issued in February 1970 states that no full-time VA physician may engage in the regular practice of medicine outside the VA institutional environment nor in any activity that can be construed as the continuing care of a non-VA patient. A full-time VA physician may, however, perform and bill for "clinical consultations" under certain circumstances.

The same restrictions on practicing medicine outside the VA setting do not apply to part-time VA physicians. In this regard, we noted that nine of the VA physicians identified as full time in our report (B-166866, April 2, 1970) to your Committee are identified in this report as employed part time (seven-eighths). (See app. I.) In addition to helping administer the Medicare program, Florida Blue Shield helps administer other Federal or federally assisted health programs involving direct patient care, such as Medicaid, the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS), and the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program (FEHBP). Further, most of the 70 VA physicians were employed also by the university and had received compensation from or through the university which was financed, in part, from Federal grants.

PAYMENTS BY BLUE SHIELD

Florida Blue Shield furnished us with a list of payments for the services of the 70 VA physicians during the period January through September 1972 under the above programs. (See app. I.) We believe that the reported payments, which totaled about \$173,000, are significantly understated because they do not include payments made to departments or other medical groups of the University of Miami Medical School for services billed by these organizations in the physicians' names. Such payments are tabulated annually by Blue Shield. We have requested the carrier to furnish us with such a list for calendar year 1972, which we will send to you.

Bases for payments

The payments include amounts paid to the physicians (assigned claims) under their registry numbers and amounts paid to program beneficiaries on the basis of itemized bills from the physicians (unassigned claims). For example, of the \$139,000 reported as paid under Medicare, about \$101,000 was for unassigned claims and was paid to the beneficiaries who presumably paid the doctors.

Except for \$1,332 paid by Florida¹ to Dr. Enrique Suarez-Diaz, the amounts for Medicaid represent the deductible

and coinsurance amounts applicable to Medicare beneficiaries eligible for both programs. Otherwise, the reported amounts do not include deductible and coinsurance amounts, which are usually beneficiaries' responsibility. For example, the coinsurance for physicians' services under Medicare is 20 percent of allowed charges, which means that the beneficiaries paid or owed the doctors at least \$34,750 more than the \$139,000 reported. The coinsurance under CHAMPUS for physicians' services is 20 percent of allowed charges for dependents of activeduty military personnel and 25 percent of allowed charges for retired personnel and their dependents and for the dependents of deceased personnel.

University's Professional Income Plan

Sixty of the 70 VA physicians were also employed by the university medical school and, according to university officials, were required to participate in the university's Professional Income Plan. Under this plan participating physicians turn over their professional fees to the university medical school for distribution to the school, its departments, and the participating physicians. Therefore, except for the 10 nonparticipating physicians marked with references to note a in appendix I, the amounts paid by Blue Shield presumably were turned over to the university.

COMPENSATION OF VA PHYSICIANS

Appendix II shows the compensation from VA and from or through the university for the 70 VA physicians (for January through July 1972). Fifteen of these physicians were not employed by the university or had not been paid anything by the university during this period. Additional information on the sources of the \$482,000 in compensation from the university is discussed below.

Federal grants and contracts

The \$147,000 in Federal grants and contracts used by the university to compensate the VA physicians was obtained primarily from training and research grants awarded to the

university by the National Institutes of Health, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW). Other HEW grant funds involved the Regional Medical Programs Service and the National Institute of Mental Health of the Health Services and Mental Health Administration and the Social and Rehabilitation Service. There was also one research grant from the Office of Naval Research, Department of the Navy.

Professional Income Plan

As discussed on page 3, physicians employed by the university participate in the university's Professional Income Plan whereby the fees collected by the physicians are turned over to the university medical school for distribution.

According to university officials annual gross salary ceilings are established for physicians employed by the university. The compensation received from VA is applied against the ceiling, and the balance is financed from university funds, including the funds paid into the Professional Income Plan. A physician need not generate professional fees to be paid with funds from the plan. University officials said that physicians may receive bonuses from the plan above their salary ceilings, if the plan's earnings exceed initial plan expenditures, including basic salary payments to participating physicians. According to the plan, bonuses are determined on the basis of the collections attributable to the physicians.

Private grants and contracts

The \$47,000 in private grants and contracts used by the university to compensate the VA physicians included (1) funds for research and teaching received from the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, (2) a loan from the Dermatology Foundation of Miami to support the salary of Dr. Henry W. Menn, and (3) a scholarship grant from the Leukemia Society of America.

¹The loan is repayable by the university from any surplus funds in the Professional Income Plan generated by the physician. If Dr. Menn does not generate sufficient funds, the loan would not be repaid.

Other

The \$104,000 in other funds used by the university to compensate the VA physicians was derived from unrestricted income, such as tuition, unrestricted grants, and investment income.

We obtained this information principally from Florida Blue Shield, the VA hospital, and the university medical school; however, the matters discussed in this report were not presented to VA, the university, or the individuals mentioned for their review and comment.

Since this report contains information, the disclosure of which may be prohibited by section 1905 of title XVIII, United States Code, we shall not make this report available to the public. The statute referred to makes it a criminal offense to disclose, among other things, the "amount or source of any income, profits, losses, or expenditures" of any person or firm.

We hope that this report is responsive to your Committee's request.
