This is in reply to your jetter of lovember 13, 1977, conceraing your Government-wide stuby of small purchase orocosures.

Gno has the following general coments in resmonse to your questions.

We anree that substituting longer term arrangements for small, repetitive purchases is desirable, Gho has auccessfully implenented such a policy by setting up annual "blanket oqreements" through the use of open purchase orders or requirements contracts.

GAO has no autonated or combuterjzed procedures or systens used in connection with small purchases. He would, therefore, sumoort the establishment of an interagency registry to serve as a focal point of information on automated or computerimed roourement data systeme. Such a registry woule be mite useful as a means of isentifying which agencies might be able to did us in this regard should the need arise,

We have not बeveloped unique small purchase procedures. nuidelines, and instructions for use within GAO. GAO follows qerarblly the snall purchase mocedare quidelines ontained io the fegeral Procurenent mogulations (fpg).

GAO recommends periodic review at the procuring office level of recurring small purchases for the purpose of establishing term contracts where feasible. This is a current GAO procedure, which we have found to be quite effective.
