GAO previously reported to Congress that the degree to which holidays were being observed overseas appeared to be inappropriate. The Department of State advised its diplomatic and consular posts of these findings and asked them to review their holiday observance policies. The posts were told that they should observe only local holidays where failure to do so would be contrary to the interests of the United States, but the posts were not specifically instructed to reduce the number of holidays observed. Findings/Conclusions: U.S. Embassies in the 17 countries originally reviewed recognized an average of 19.8 holidays in 1973 and 19.1 in 1976. According to 1977 holiday schedules, these Embassies will recognize an average of 18.2 holidays. The decrease in 1977 is largely because the Embassy in Laos reduced the number of holidays it recognized to 14, down from 30 in 1973 and 25 in 1976. It would appear that the posts need stronger urging if the number of holidays recognized overseas are to be significantly reduced. In October 1977, the Civil Service Commission asked Federal departments and agencies to comment on proposed guidelines for observing holidays in foreign areas. The guidelines emphasize giving American and foreign national employees only these holidays which are their official holidays unless the employees are placed on annual leave for the day or the annual pay of foreign national employees is reduced to reflect additional non-workdays resulting from observing Pederal holidays. The guidelines appear to be sufficiently flexible to cover the varying circumstances within and between foreign countries and specific enough, if properly implemented, to reduce the number of lost workdays. Dear Mr. Secretary:

On March 17, 1975, we reported to the Congress on the need for improving holiday administration overseas and said, among other things, that the degree to which holidays were being observed appeared to be inappropriate. (See "Holiday Administration Overseas: Improvement Needed to Achieve More Equitable Treatment of Employees," (ID-75-42)).

In September 1975, the Department advised its diplomatic and consular posts of our report's principal findings and recommendations. The posts were asked to review their holiday observance policies in the light of our report. The Department also informed the posts that, in accordance with existing provisions of the Foreign Affairs Manual, they should observe only local holidays where failure to do so would be contrary to the interests of the United States. The posts were not specifically instructed to reduce the number of holidays to be observed.

According to our recent followup review, the U.S. Embassies in the 17 countries included in our original review recognized an average of 19.8 holidays in 1973 and 19.1 in 1976. (See encs. I and II.) According to 1977 holiday schedules, these Embassies will recognize an average of 18.2 holidays. The decrease in 1977 is largely because the Embassy in Laos reduced the number of holidays it recognized to 14, down from 30 in 1973 and 25 in 1976. It would appear that the posts need stronger urging if the number of holidays recognized overseas are to be significantly reduced.

In October 1977, the Civil Service Commission asked Federal departments and agencies to comment on a draft Federal Personnel Manual letter and proposed guidelines for observing holidays in foreign areas. These guidelines grew out of the response by the Commission and the Office of Management and Budget to our March 1975 report. B-180403

The proposed guidelines emphasize giving American and foreign national employees only those holidays which are their official holidays unless the employees are placed on annual leave for the day or the annual pay of foreign national employees is reduced to reflect additional non-workdays resulting from observing Federal holidays. These guidelines state that only in circumstances where work cannot be properly performed may employees be dismissed without a charge to annual leave (or pay in the case of foreign national employees) on other than their official holidays. Examples of such circumstances are set forth in the guidelines.

We believe that the proposed guidelines ar sufficiently flexible to cover the varying circumstances within and between foreign countries and specific enough in intent so that, if properly implemented, they should reduce the number of lost workdays.

We continue to be concerned about holiday administration overseas and trust that the Department will take the steps necessary to ensure the effective implementation by U.S. overseas posts of the guidelines prepared by the Civil Service Commission.

We are sending copies of this letter to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, and selected congressional committees.
