Subject: Analysis of Requirements for Recurring Reports to the Congress (PAD-80-72)

AN ANALYSIS OF REQUIREMENTS FOR RECURRING REPORTS TO THE CONGRESS

BACKGROUND

Title VIII of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-344) assigned the Comptroller General the responsibility to identify congressional information needs as expressed in legislative requirements; to monitor the various reporting requirements of the Congress; to identify congressional needs for fiscal, budgetary, and program-related information; and to maintain a central file or files of fiscal and budgetary information. (As a part of its efforts to fulfill these responsibilities, the General Accounting Office (GAO) maintains an inventory on congressional reporting requirements. This inventory, established in 1976, is the principal source used in our analysis of requirements for recurring reports.

The current inventory of requirements for recurring reports is compiled from information furnished by Federal agencies in response to an annual GAO request to update this data. Each agency is provided with (1) a printout from our data base listing existing requirements for recurring reports which GAO has identified, through various research approaches, as the agency's responsibility; and (2) a list of new requirements identified in legislation from the most recent Congress. Each agency is then asked to update, confirm, or refute the listed requirements. We also identify the committee having jurisdiction over each recurring reporting requirement. This task is accomplished by researching the legislative history of every statute containing a reporting requirement.

NUMBER AND FREQUENCY OF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The number of reporting requirements currently in our data base is 2,039. This figure includes not only reports required by statute but also nonstatutory and voluntary reports. As depicted in table 1, page 10, the frequency of submission and number of recurring reporting requirements are as follows:

During each session of Congress, a number of "one-time" reporting requirements are also levied on agencies by committees, committee members, and House and Senate reports. These, however, are not included in the above total.

COST OF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

We maintain three categories of cost information in our inventory: developmental, operational, and staff hours. During our survey to collect information and update our inventory, we request each agency to provide cost data for every report prepared. The agencies are advised to use the National Archives and Records Service's <u>Guide to Estimating Reporting Costs</u> to calculate costs. Some agencies do not submit cost information for all reporting requirements. An examination of the agencies' reported cost data reveals wide variances in both dollars and staffing for very similar reports. We have not attempted to validate the accuracy of agencies' cost data. Accordingly, the cost data should be viewed as an approximation rather than as an absolute.

The reported cost for the 2,039 1/ recurring reporting requirements is in the range of \$20 million. Table 2, page 11, depicts the cost and percentage breakdown of recurring reports by branch of government. A summary of the reported cost incurred by branch of government is as follows:

As displayed in table 2, executive departments and principal agencies and commissions incur approximately 90 percent of all costs associated with recurring reporting requirements.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS RESPOND TO THE LARGEST NUMBER OF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Table 3, pages 12 through 17, shows the number of reporting requirements by agency. The approximate cost for report preparation is also reflected by agency. The agencies responding to the largest number of reporting requirements are as follows:

Although the aforementioned agencies respond to the largest number of reporting requirements, some of the most expensive reports are issued by other agencies. Below is a list of the 10 most expensive reports. Together they account for approximately half the total cost of reporting requirements. FOUR CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES HAVE JURISDICTION OVER A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF ALL REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Tables 4, 5 and 6, pages 18 through 20, highlight the number of reporting requirements by Senate, House, and Joint Committees. The committees which levy the largest number of reporting requirements are as follows:

There appears to be some correlation between the agencies responding to the largest number of reporting requirements (see table 3) and the committees responsible for these requirements (see table 4). For example, the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources has primary oversight responsibility for the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare and the Department of Labor. The House and Senate Armed Services Committees have primary oversight responsibility for the Department of Defense.

OVERLAP/DUPLICATION OF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

To assess the extent of duplication and/or overlap among congressional reporting requirements, we analyzed several hundred legislative reporting requirements, agency abstracts of reporting requirements, and the actual

agency report documents submitted in response to the requirements. We concentrated our analysis on four functional areas: health, education, welfare, and energy. Using GAO's congressional reporting requirements inventory, we identified all the reporting requirements in each functional area and then systematically analyzed the requirements by subject. We supplemented this analysis by comparing each report document to its specific reporting requirement and to other reports within the same subject area.

The criterion we used to determine the extent of duplication or overlap was whether or not reports in the same subject area could be modified, consolidated, or eliminated and still meet the legislative intent to satisfy the informational and oversight needs of the Congress. Our research did not reveal a substantial amount of overlap or duplication. We did find, however, several reports that contained overlapping or duplicative information. We eliminated most of these from consideration because they were very limited in scope. This indicates that a number of requirements are designed to meet specific information needs and are not broad enough to support the needs of a number of congressional user groups.

Specifically, with respect to determining overlap, of the 520 recurring reporting requirements and abstracts we reviewed, 88 appeared to overlap in informational content. However, after a more in-depth review of the responses to these requirements, we identified 14 requirements that appear to overlap. Table 8, pages 23 through 26, contains a list of the reports that appear to overlap.

In regard to duplicative reports, two requirements were identified as obviously duplicative. The requirement for the "Report of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission", (GAO Accession Number 06200-014), contained in the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, (P.L. 86-43, sec. 1, 73 Stat. 73, 42 U.S.C. 2016) duplicates the requirement for the "Report to the President by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission", (GAO Accession Number 06200-013), contained in the Energy Reorganization Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-438, sec. 307(c), 88 Stat. 1251, 42 U.S.C. 5877(c)). The Nuclear Regulatory Commission considers P.L. 93-438 as the authority for their annual report. The Commission does not submit a report based on P.L. 86-43.

GAO EFFORTS TO MODIFY OR ELIMINATE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

As mentioned previously, the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 stipulates that the Comptroller General shall monitor the various recurring reporting requirements of the Congress and committees and make recommendations to the Congress. In accordance with this mandate, the House Committee on Government Operations is considering two bills that will eliminate or modify certain reporting requirements. The legislation is the result of work by the General Accounting Office and the Office of Management and Budget. GAO is currently working with the House Government Operations committee in an effort to combine the two bills, which will eliminate or modify approximately 239 reporting requirements.
