Dear Senator Reid:

In your November 9, 1987, letter, you asked us to quantify the costs, in time and money, associated with the federal government's efforts to defend and promote the rights of American Indians. In subsequent discussions with your office, you asked that we acquire statistical data on these costs for fiscal years 1982 through 1987 but exclude those costs incurred on behalf of Alaskan Natives. You also asked that we limit our review to the Department of Justice, which has responsibility for providing litigation services for Indians.

Title 25 U.S.C. 175 directs that U.S. Attorneys represent Indians in all suits to protect and defend their rights and privileges. Within the Department of Justice, the Indian Resources Section, Land and Natural Resources Division, carries out this responsibility of defending Indian rights and privileges. Cases are referred to the Indian Resources Section by other federal agencies that are charged by law with protecting Indian rights. This fact sheet presents detailed statistical information on the Indian Resources Section's case load and staffing and associated costs incurred in defending Indian rights.

In summary, we found that for fiscal years 1982 through 1987 the Indian Resources Section expended about \$5.1 million to carry out its mission of litigating Indian rights cases. Of the \$5.1 million, about \$3.9 million was for personnel compensation and benefits. The remaining \$1.2 million was for other expenses, such as travel costs, rent, supplies, materials, and equipment. These funds supported approximately 10 attorneys and 4 staff members each year during this 6-year period. During this same period, attorneys within the Indian Resources Section worked 84,638 staff hours on 654 cases defending Indian rights. To develop the information included in this fact sheet, we obtained computer-generated statistics from Justice's Land and Natural Resources Division. As agreed with your office, we did not verify the information obtained. The information presented in this fact sheet was, however, reviewed and agreed with by the Deputy Executive Assistant, Land and Natural Resources Division, as to its accuracy and completeness.

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As agreed with your office, unless you publicly announce its contents earlier, we plan no further distribution of this fact sheet until 15 days from the date of this letter. #### STATISTICAL DATA ON INDIAN RIGHTS CASES HANDLED BY JUSTICE'S INDIAN RESOURCES SECTION

Table 1.1 lists the total number and status of all Indian cases, for fiscal years 1982 through 1987, that the Indian Resources Section handled and shows the department or agency that referred the case.

<sup>a</sup>The total hours in this column include professional development (training), drafting and reviewing proposed legislation, counseling, administrative time, and leave, in addition to time spent by attorneys on Indian cases.

<sup>b</sup>Hours also include court time and overtime. Even though attorneys record the number of hours associated with overtime for cases, they do not receive additional compensation, because they are salaried employees.

<sup>C</sup>Each year's case count includes all cases worked on during that year, some of which may have been carried over from a previous year.

Table 1.3 lists the type and number of staff within the Indian Resources Section, along with the total salaries associated with each staff type. Salaries are based on grade/step of each staff member as of September 30 for each fiscal year.

<sup>b</sup>One attorney who was paid on a per-day basis and was classified as an other than full-time permanent employee is not included in the salary total. Justice's financial management group within the Land and Natural Resources Division maintains a financial accounting of all funds expended by each section within the Division, including the Indian Resources Section. Accordingly, table 1.4 lists this section's expenditures by object class for the fiscal years covered by our review.
